Why you should get tested for hepatitis C

- A once-in-a-lifetime hepatitis C screening is covered as a preventative service under the Affordable Care Act—testing is covered under many health plans at no cost
- An estimated 3.5 million persons are living with hepatitis C¹
- Untreated, hepatitis C can lead to cirrhosis of the liver, liver cancer, or liver failure
- In many cases, hepatitis C can be cured with just 12 weeks of treatment

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
